Sunday, April 7th

Title: "Finite Beings, Infinite Interdependence" (*Rev. Annie preaching*)

Interdependence is simply a fact of life. On this small earth with one atmosphere, one set of oceans, one global economy, what one person does affects life and beings and people all over the globe. How far do we lean into our connections with others and where do we draw boundaries? When is something happening to others our responsibility and when do we focus on our own well-being? We'll explore the inherent tensions in the vastness of our interdependent web and our finite capacities.

Sunday, April 14th

Title: "The Ties That Bind and the Scissors" (*Rev. Jamie preaching*)

America has a loneliness epidemic, warns a new report by the Surgeon General, with serious consequences for our emotional, physical, and communal well-being. How have we become so isolated in a world in which we also seem to be drowning in communication? What are the forces separating us and how can we begin reconnecting? Join us for a service about the centrality of interdependence to our collective healing.

Sunday, April 21st

Title: "The Joy of Being Just" (*Led by Kannan Thiruvengadam and the FPB Environmental Justice Committee*)

The guest speaker for our Earth Day Service is Kannan Thiruvengadam. Kannan leads Eastie Farm, an urban farm in East Boston that fosters food security, regenerative land use, and environmental stewardship. He says: "I lost my own mother as a child. Later in life, I learned climate science and realized the risks to our shared mother earth. I sought relief in action, running a farm that empowers young people to be compassionate climate leaders, and an advocacy group fighting for a beautiful coastal habitat. Every day I ask myself: 'Am I healthy enough to be kind? Am I grateful enough to be hopeful? What's my role in the care for creation?' Together, let us explore these questions, and those in your heart."

There will be an opportunity for in-person Question & Answer with Kannan following the service from 11:15 to 11:45 am in the Bacon Room.

We are so blessed as a congregation with the wealth of artistic talent you all bring to Sunday morning. And, of course, we are lucky to have Brad, Natan, Sandra, and Steve on our musical team, bringing it all together and making it happen with dedication, vision, expertise, and an unshakeable spirit of fun!

Before Easter Sunday I was deeply moved to be participating in the powerful Tenebrae service for the first time. And before *that* there was the joyous occasion of my installation service. I am grateful to everyone who took part in making that happen, from the planning team, to the choir, to the musicians, to the staff, to the Board, to the tech crew, to the many colleagues who participated in the service. And, of course, I am grateful to everyone who came out and celebrated with us.

Also in March! An Irish Fest, a Cabaret, the Obertones, games clubs, youth groups, an expedition to see the Addams Family high school musical, listening circles a-plenty, an International Women's Day Service, some regular services, meditations, vespers, pot lucks, book groups, small groups, a BAKED POTATO FUNDRAISER, karaoke, a movie night in the Bacon room, demonstrations at Hanscom, and many other things I am sure I have missed. Whew. What a month!

Now, here is something that happened in March that you may not be aware of that I want to tell you about. In March, by vote of the Parish Board, First Parish officially became a partner congregation of UU Mass Action. Maybe you remember Rev. Jo giving an energetic welcome from UU Mass Action during my installation service with chants of "Justice! Justice! Justice!" We'd signed the partnership agreement that afternoon.

In their words, UU Mass Action "is the original state-wide UU organizing and advocacy group in the US. [Their] mission is to connect the 140 Unitarian Universalist congregations and 25,000 members, to "work smarter, not harder" for social justice by sharing ideas and joining forces to raise our compassionate voice in Massachusetts so we can have an impact."

UU Mass Action empowers UUs to come together to work collaboratively with other UU congregations and partner organizations on social justice issues like environmental justice, immigration rights, community safety and de-incarceration, housing rights and economic justice, and many other issues of concern to UUs. By joining in partnership with UU Mass Action we get access to training and resources to raise up social justice leaders in our own congregation. And we become more effective in carrying out our mission, because we are not trying to do the work alone.

We encourage you to check them out and get involved. In the long run, our goal is to work with them to build up social justice leaders in our

congregation, grow our relationships in the community, and show up more boldly and effectively in Massachusetts (and beyond!)

I am grateful to the Board for their vision in entering into this partnership and I look forward to all the good work (and good trouble) that lies ahead. As always, please do not hesitate to reach out if you have questions.

Office Matters

We've made it to Spring! Although it seems Mother Nature did not get the memo yet. As we dive into April, we are looking forward to another fun-filled month of events, such as the Talents & Treasures Auction this Saturday, the Folk Music Concert this Sunday, and a Jazz Concert planned for the end of the month.

With all the upcoming activities, there may be an increased need for booking rooms/Zooms for your meeting. In order to better serve you, please contact Stacey (skatz@uubedford.org) **at least 3-5 business days in advance** so we have plenty of time to schedule heat/air-conditioning (here's hoping!). And we ask the same for booking a Zoom meeting. Please reach out to me at parishadministrator@uubedford.org **at least 3-5 business days in advance**.

Given some of these events will involve tasty treats and beverages, I wanted to take this time to remind everyone again of our food policy with regards to receptions, Memorial Services, parties, etc.... Below please find the details:

- Leftover perishable foods can only be served to children/youth the same day;
- Common allergen food labels in bowl/basket to be put out with foods being served to reduce accidental consumption;
- Provide communication to internal/external groups that all food must be removed after the event, with the exception of packaged food or one medium tray per item (i.e. one vegetable tray, one fruit tray, etc...);
- Tape/marker will be left in the kitchen for easy labeling of dates on food;
- Ice cream related toppings need to be checked for expiration dates so they don't pile up.

With our new Stewardship Campaign in full swing, I am happily entering each pledge card or online submission form as soon as they cross my desk/email! For accounting purposes, when you start sending in payments towards the new campaign, please try to write the new pledge year on the memo line (24/25). This extra step would be very helpful to Stacey and I. And it will help us keep the most accurate records possible when it comes to following up with everyone in the fall.

Lastly, per my recent email, while we are in this interim period with our regular Sexton (Mark McCarthy) out due to a medical issue, I wanted to take this time to remind you that if you are the last one in the building, please make sure that all of the lights are off, the coffee pots/tea kettles are unplugged, and all of the doors are locked. The lists of weekly events are posted every Monday just inside the Elm Street entrance and also just outside the office on the wall near the Sanctuary entrance. Please look for your group on the list, and if there isn't any other event booked afterwards, you should assume you are the last ones in the building. Please help us save energy and keep our building secure.

This month, I want to begin by thanking everyone who was involved in planning and executing the very special service and celebration for Jamie Hinson-Rieger's installation as the next senior minister of First Parish. Personally, I found the service and covenanting between Jamie and the congregation, and then later in the service with John Gibbons, especially emotional and poignant as we had Jamie, John, Annie, and Megan all together with us participating in this rite of passage for First Parish. As some parishioners later commented, "It just felt whole!" We are so fortunate as a congregation to have such strong ministerial leadership.

As I write this, the "Keep the Momentum Going" Stewardship Campaign is well underway with promising results. Thanks go to Nancy Daugherty for creating the poster that is enabling us to mark progress as a person climbs from one step up to the next to reach our goal of \$560,000. We set the deadline for this year's pledge drive as Sunday, April 21. This gives

us some time to create the detailed budget which will finance our needs and desires for next year and be voted on at our June 9 congregational Annual Meeting.

Related to this, after two very productive forums with current families with children in Faith Development programming and recent teachers, and with Annie taking on the challenging dual roles of Faith Development for Children as well as her own responsibilities, the Board voted at our last meeting to go ahead and authorize the hiring of a new Director of Faith Development for next year. At Jamie and Annie's urging, we would ideally like to hire a full-time person who would help to grow the program with specifically targeted outreach and social media responsibilities. This full-time position depends on the outcome of our pledge drive.

The Board has also recently signed an agreement to be a partner organization with UU Mass Action (<https://www.uumassaction.org/partners-coalitions>). Our FP youth have been involved with their Youth Corps for a few years, and, knowing how important Social Action is to this congregation, we decided to partner with this UU organization which will help us connect with other groups who are doing the same kind of work that we want to do. Finally, a reminder that the Board meetings are on the last Wednesday of the month. Please reach out to any one of your Board members if you have a topic that you want addressed. The minutes of all but the most recent meeting of the Board can be found online in the "About Us" section of the church website, under "Parish Documents" and then "Board Meeting Minutes". They are very thorough and describe what we have been doing each month.

Climate Cafe

Climate Cafe, April 7th @ 11:30am, Bacon Room

The Environmental Justice Committee (EJC) is coordinating a Climate Cafe after the April 7th service to learn more about the Public Comment Period happening NOW (thru May 10) to respond to the developer's DEIR (Draft Environmental Impact Report) for the proposed Hanscom Field hangar project for private jets.

Rick Johnson, former attorney for the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), will provide a brief overview of the MEPA (MA Environmental Policy Act) and DEIR process, and why it is important for people to submit public comment opposing the project, followed by Q&A (facilitated by Rev. Jamie).




